## LESSONS LEARNED

- 1. Any development of CTI projects has to involve all Government agencies including stakeholders.
- 2. Increase participation and coordination from all stakeholders is crucial.
- 3. Development of a pool of national experts through the implementation of CTI national projects with partners.

- ✓ Insufficient <u>funding and allocations</u> to conduct programs/activities
- ✓ Lacking of <u>manpower</u> with the capacity to execute program and activities
- ✓ Crosscutting roles of institutional networking



#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- ✓ Tailored training course to improve human capital development in the implementation of each NPOA/RPOA programs and activities
- ✓ Clear guideline for proposals submission at national/regional level
- √ Thoroughly identify & recognise matching fund in NPOA/RPOA prioritised area
- ✓ Active participation of stakeholders at senior management level
