- 1. The 18th Senior Officials' Meeting (SOM-18) of the Coral Triangle Initiative on Coral Reefs, Fisheries and Food Security (CTI-CFF) was conducted via the ZOOM Virtual Meeting Platform on 6-7 November 2023.

- groups' agendas, and exploring integration of gender equity through CT's GESI policy and Women Leaders Forum Roadmap.
- 10.4. Proposed the Regional Secretariat to support this regional alignment of NBSAPs by organising knowledge exchange between relevant CT6 officials, Partners, and CBD Secretariat.
- 10.5. Acknowledged the efforts of partners, CTC and WWF-CTP, with support from USAID-RDMA USAID SuFiA TS, in working with the RS to develop the CTI-CFF Capacity Building RoadMap (Annex 10.2);
- 10.6. Acknowledged the extensive inputs from the CT6 in CTI-CFF Capacity Building RoadMap development that have been incorporated into the three-year workplan;
- 10.7. Endorsed the vision of the CTI-CFF Capacity Building RoadMap 'To accelerate skills-building across the CT to sustain and effectively manage resilient marine and coastal resources and seascape ecosystem services, in support of the RPoA2.0 targets, benefitting nature and communities;
- 10.8. Endorsed the three-year workplan of the RoadMap under the four pillars, and task Regional Secretariat to collaboratively ensure sustainability and achievement of the vision of the 2030 CTI-CFF Capacity Building RoadMap;
- 10.9. Tasked the Regional Secretariat to establish a small team with partners to lead the implementation of the CTI-CFF Capacity Building RoadMap.
- 10.10. Reaffirmed the need for Trust Fund to reduce the increasing risks from the changing climate and prioritize marine protected and conserved areas in the Coral Triangle which are effective, climate resilient, and sustainable while benefiting nature and communities (Annex 10.3);
- 10.11. Re-affirmed to launch the Trust Fund by 2nd Quarter of 2024;
- 10.12. Tasked the RS to be actively supporting the Regional Trust Fund Board and Regional Trust Fund Technical Team (WCS/CFA);
- 10.13. Acknowledged CT6 Countries involvement in the Trust Fund Advisory Group and Grants Committee:
- 10.14. Encouraged FRWG to identify one representative for the upcoming donor roundtables;
- 10.15. Acknowledged that the Trust Fund Steering Committee has selected the prospective Founding Board Members;
- 10.16. Acknowledged and approved Dr Christovel Rotinsulu to be the Acting Regional Conservation Trust Fund Board Chair from 9 Nov 2023 until new CTI-CFF Executive Director on board:



- 10.17. Acknowledged the Regional Conservation Trust Fund as per SOM16 (decision 7.6) and SOM17 (decision 6.3) and the need to find branding name for the trust fund;
- 10.18. Agreed to use the name of Coral Triangle Conservation Fund (CTCF) for the marketing purposes of the Regional Conservation Trust Fund (RCTF);
- 10.19. Acknowledged that RS will be hiring the CTCF "CEO" as a consultant under CTI-CFF RS until such time as the Fund is legally constituted; thereafter the CTCF CEO will be a staff of the Fund:
- 10.20. Tasked Regional Secretariat to Initiate resource mobilization from potential donors and funding agencies;
- 10.21. Acknowledged and approved the infographic to be used by all parties for promotion of Regional Plan of Action 2.0. (Annex 10.4)
- 10.22. Acknowledged that Regional Secretariat has successfully developed technical and cost applications for the direct grant from USAID/RDMA (USAID Sustainable Coral Triangle);
- 10.23. Endorsed draft grant agreement between USAID/RDMA and CTI-CFF for USAID Sustainable Coral Triangle (Annex 10.5.a-b);
- 10.24. Acknowledged the funding from DOI ITAP for the Coral Triangle Conservation Fund CEO and endorsed the CEO's appointment;
- 10.25. Tasked RS to develop a concept note for the remaining DOI-ITAP support and to begin implementation of USAID Sustainable Coral Triangle.
